The main change that was proposed in the referendum was to make Poland less democratic, and move it away from its current liberal democratic system. Tens of thousands of Poles were asked to represent their district in the parliament that, under the current system, is chosen through the use of party-political proportional representation. The supporters of the change argued that with the new system, "elected representatives will be more loyal to their party leaders, and less concerned with the people of their districts". In the run-up to the vote, those in favour of the change received cash bribes from the ruling party to promote the change and to vote for it. The opposition party, the People's Party, and several non-government organisations opposed the change, with the largest non-government organisation spending almost all of its donations for its campaign against the change. The use of money to try to buy votes has become known as the "smear campaign" and has been seen in elections elsewhere in Europe. But what was the result? The "yes" camp won, with a turnout of around 47% and with a 61% majority of the vote. The "no" camp, however, was shocked by the result. There was a high turnout of more than 66%, but the result was just 30% of the vote. Both the opposition and the anti-smear campaign claimed that money had influenced the result.
